

JANUARY 7, 1972

SENATOR KREMER: (Discussion in progress) to bracket that bill until a week from next Monday. Some of those that have interest in the bill are proposing some amendments on the bill and I am asking unanimous consent to bracket the bill until a week from Monday.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kremer has asked unanimous consent to bracket the bill until a week from next Monday. Are there any objections? Hearing none. So ordered. The floor is again open. Are the resolutions on the desk?

CLERK: Mr. President, there are resolutions to be signed.

PRESIDENT: Do we have any bills for introduction?

CLERK: None. We have one committee report, Mr. President, your committee in Enrollment & Review respectfully reports. Report read. That's all, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Do I see a bill for introduction? Work sheet shows all bills on Select File as bracketed. Move to consideration of bills on General File. Unless there is anything else on the desk. The Chair recognizes Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I noticed on my desk this morning a note from Senator Mahoney. I wish to say that I wish that everyone of you in here would take a look at this note that he passed out in the second paragraph. Pay particular attention to these reports that were being made by the investigators we had working in the drug area. Now, I think that it would be appropriate for every one of you to take these reports, whichever ones you're interested in, over the week-end and take them home and look at them. They are very good reports and I think they give you a pretty good idea of what they are. And they are not too long and easy to read. They're only about two or three pages. So pay particular attention to that second paragraph on the note that Senator Mahoney sent around. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The first bill on General File in debate this morning would be the LB146, constitutional amendment. Senator Syas.

SENATOR SYAS: We talked it over. Some of us that are sponsors of these bills, these constitutional amendments as the Legislature well knows are probably, I think probably the most important than the budget we'll do this session. There is too many absent today to give a fair reading on these constitutional amendments, therefore, I think we should lay them over and I'll ask for unanimous consent until next week. I want them discussed as soon as possible. We all do, the introducers of these bills. We put a lot of time in these bills but today with the seven or nine persons short, it isn't a fair situation. These are very controversial items.

PRESIDENT: Senator Syas has asked unanimous consent to lay the constitutional amendments, that would be through 124 over until next week. Are there any objections to that? Hearing none. So ordered. The first bill would be 864 for General File debate. Clerk will read the title.
