SENATOR DE CAMP: (Discussion in progress) actual implementation date would be beneficial. So for that reason I object to the withdrawal only for the purpose of offering this amendment and using this bill as a vehicle to solve this problem.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Kremer, there has been an objection. What's your pleasure?

Get the Senators in their seats please, and we will proceed on schedule. The first bill on Final Reading is LB490.
