SPEAKER HASEBROOCK: Like to recognize the birthday of one of our colleagues that was yesterday, Senator Moylan of Omaha. I'd like to have the Lt. Governor lead in singing Happy Birthday to Senator Moylan.

PRESIDENT: Senator Moylan

SENATOR MOYLAN: Mr. Chairman and members of the legislature, I wish to thank you kindly, but at this time I would also like to congratulate our Lt. Governor on his 29th Anniversary yesterday.

PRESIDENT: Oh, thank you Senator, thank you. I might add that this is the first time I have ever spent my anniversary with a candidate. Do we have any other business on the desk?

CLERK: Read motion.

SPEAKER HASEBROOCK: Members of the Legislature, I would like to make one more announcement. We are going to have the priority list printed in the work sheet for tomorrow. Now there have been a few changes because some of the bills that the Senators had have been taken up. If you will get to the Speakers office or to my secretary we must have it by noon, or it won't get on this list. This will be printed on the worksheet beginning tomorrow. You will know where they are and who they are, what number it is. What number it is.

CLERK: Read

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter, what is your pleasure regarding the bill?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Is that my bill I just put up there?

CLERK: Yes sir.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Mr. President, this bill was brought to me by the people involved in the veterans affairs. They are now having a great deal of trouble so they say in the area of these veterans who are coming back, who have come back, attempting to get them employment under the laws that have existed, but they find them quite difficult because there are no penalties or procedures in which a veteran to the labor department can present his case and attempt to obtain employment as he had before he left. That is the purpose of the bill. I move for its introduction.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion of the motion? Any further discussion of the motion regarding the bill? Question is shall the rules be suspended and the bill introduced? All those in favor say Aye, all those opposed say No. Has everyone voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 32 Ayes, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Do you need to read the title again after his introduction?

CLERK: Properly we should Mr. President. Clerk read.
