PRESIDENT: Senator Keyes, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. President, how many days is left?

SENATOR WARNER: Well, I am hoping I can pass them out tomorrow. I should be, they are virtually completed.

PRESIDENT: We are moving towards the Final Reading of 1274.

SENATOR : A point of order, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: State your point, Senator.

SENATOR : The next bill LB1429 is a constitutional amendment which was added the other day, a provision to put it on the primary ballot. To save time I find myself in rather unusual circumstances. While I would like to have the bill passed but on the first vote, if we would not have forty votes then we would revote and have thirty votes and put it on the General Election. The provision is for to put LB1429 on the primary election. We are past the date, it is impossible to put it on the primary ballot. So if we would receive fewer than thirty-nine votes on the first vote we could then revote, receive the thirty votes and put it on the General Election.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Whitney, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR WHITNEY: A point of order, Mr. President. I feel that it is already in the law that you have one vote and it is automatically put on the fall election if it does not get the forty votes. Isn't that correct? Oh, Vince, says that we have to vote twice. Okay.

PRESIDENT: That is correct. Two votes are required. Senator Klaver. Alright. Thank you, sir. We'll get it. Would you help get a copy of 1429 for Senator Klaver? Someone share a book with him there. Attention please, the Final Reading of LB1429.
