PRESIDENT: Will the Legislature please come to order. We will have prayer by the Chaplain.

CHAPLAIN: Prayer.

PRESIDENT: Roll call.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Richendifer would like to be excused for the day.

PRESIDENT: Are there any objections? Hearing none, so ordered.

CLERK: Senator Luedtke would like to be excused at 11 o'clock for the balance of the morning.

PRESIDENT: Any objections to Senator Luedtke's absence at 11. Hearing none, so ordered. Have you all indicated your presence. Please register in so we can tell who is here, please.

CLERK: 37 ayes, Oh no, a quorum present, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Very good. They did all vote aye.

CLERK: Senator Nore asked to be excused this afternoon and tomorrow.

PRESIDENT: Are there objections? Hearing none, so ordered. Do we have corrections for the Journal?

CLERK: Yes, Mr. President. Corrections read. That is all, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Are there corrections from the floor? If not, the Journal will stand as corrected. Do we have any notices of Committee Hearings or reports.
