SPEAKER: The Legislature will please come to order. The Chaplain will read us the prayer.

CHAPLAIN: Prayer given.

SPEAKER: Roll call. Have you all recorded your presence?

CLERK: Senator Cavanaugh has to be excused for the first hour, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Recorded. Have you all recorded your presence. Clerk will record.

CLERK: Quorum present, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Any corrections for the Journal, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: None Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Any petitions or memorials?

CLERK: I have some communications, Mr. President. We have received from Governor Exon since the adjournment of the last session, twenty five letters of appointment which we will set out in full in the Journal and transmit to the Committee on Committees.

SPEAKER: I don't believe you need to read those Mr. Clerk, they'll be in the Journal tomorrow.

CLERK: Mr. President, in addition there to we have received a series of communications. Mr. President we have received a communication from the Interstate Commerce Commission, wherein they issued an order regarding the abandonment of railroad lines which will be on file in my office if anybody has any interest in it.

Mr. President, we received a further communication on the same subject from the same Commission. We received a copy of a resolution dealing with voluntary prayers in school from the state of New Hampshire, which will be on file. We received a copy of a resolution dealing with the proposal to call a constitutional convention to amend the United States Constitution from the state of Alabama. We received a communication from the state of Delaware relative to calling a Constitution to permit to prohibit busing of school children. We received a communication from South Dakota relative to a concurrent resolution dealing with grain shipments in the midwest. We received a communication from the Honorable Sam Schwartzkopf, Mayor of the city of Lincoln, dealing with the energy crisis communicated to the Legislature. These will be on file in my office if anybody is interested in them.

Mr. President, we have a request from Senator Chambers for unanimous consent to have printed in the Journal a series of correspondence dealing with the problems of the election of the position of Governor and Lt. Governor. He's asking for unanimous consent to have this printed in the Journal.

SPEAKER: How long is it?

CLERK: It's several pages.

SPEAKER: Three separate letters. Several pages. Any objections? If not, so ordered.

CLERK: That's all the resolutions, Mr. President. A..A..I mean all the correspondence Mr. President.
