PRESIDENT: All rise for the morning prayer.

CHAPLAIN: Prayer.

PRESIDENT: The Legislature will please come to order. Roll call.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Marsh would like to be excused until she arrives. Senator Koch, Senator George until they arrive. Senator Savage all day today. Senator Marvel and Senator Moylan until they arrive. Senator Frank Lewis until he arrives. Senator Labeledz and Senator Newell would like to be excused until they arrive. Mr. President, Senator Duis would like to be excused at noon today.

PRESIDENT: Have you all recorded your presence? Make the record.

CLERK: Quorum present, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Corrections for the Journal?

CLERK: I have none, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Are there corrections from the floor? Seeing none the Journal shall stand. Do you have any notices, reports or announcements?

CLERK: Just one, Mr. President. Your committee on E & R respectfully reports that we have carefully examined and Engrossed LB 12 and find the same correctly Engrossed, and that is signed by Senator Cullan, Chairman.

PRESIDENT: Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Yes, Mr. President, I would like to add two motions. If you would take your agenda and after LB 14 on a motion by Senator Schmit add after that a motion on LR 9 by Senator DeCamp to refer to General File and then it is followed by a third motion by Senator Warner regarding all bills in committee. So, we will take up LB 14, LR 9 and then Senator Warner's motion in that order.

PRESIDENT: We will commence then, Mr. Clerk, with the motion on LB 14.

CLERK: Mr. President, pursuant to Rule 3, Section 12, Senator Schmit moves to place LB 14 on General File notwithstanding the actions of the committee. It is offered by Senator Loran Schmit.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Bellwood.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I'll be very brief. I have asked the body to place LB 14 on the floor of the legislature notwithstanding the failure by the committee to act. As I recall I believe the bill was not killed, but it is in committee.
