SENATOR FISHER: Yes, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So on the desk now is an amendment that apparently you are considered the chief introducer of, so if you no longer agree with what that amendment is trying to do which is to change the Committee on Committees action, do you want to ask the Clerk to withdraw that amendment and leave the Committee on Committees work intact, is that what you would like to do?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No...no...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, nobody can tell you what to do. I am trying to understand your desire. Do you want your name to continue to be a part of that amendment whose purpose is to change the Committee on Committees work?

SENATOR FISHER: No, I don't. I wish to withdraw my amendment, if that is what has to be done.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, and...

SENATOR FISHER: Excuse me for my ignorance on this issue, though.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, and, see, I ask all these questions because I hope the members will understand I am not trying to tell anyone what to do but just help clarify, if possible, so that a new member will understand the significance of what is happening here today. So that's all that I was trying to do and I have done it.

Just we did have an amendment on the desk, and we had to have some formal withdrawal or something of that amendment, otherwise we have to go ahead with the vote on it. I can't just simply do that.
