

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: When you say Social Service person, are you (inaudible) service coordinator?

SENATOR ROBINSON: Well, I presume the caretaker who...

SENATOR ROBINSON: In the school district of Alliance they have three children. Why couldn't someone at the school do that?

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: It's very possible there could. There is nothing in this bill that precludes the service coordination being done by the school.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay, excuse me, I'm sorry I interrupted you. Finish.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: There is nothing in this legislation that precludes the service coordination being done by school personnel.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Would you be amenable to a district opting out of this?

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: We would not be in full compliance with the federal guidelines, therefore, we would not get the \$1.2 million if we don't provide service coordination to all those families who ask for it and some may not need it. Some may not want it, but it would be their choice, not the school system.

SENATOR ROBINSON: So everyone has to be in on it. What would happen to that money if a school didn't want it? Would it go to
