They can take this keg to a keg party or whatever they want to take it to, and if the sticker comes off they said, well, they can't bring that keg back. They'll take the keg back because it's worth some dollars and they're going to want to actually do that. But I don't see how you're going to accomplish anything. You're just going to move them over to some other type of alcohol. I don't think that an actual sticker on a keg is going to accomplish what Senator Haberman wants to accomplish.
