

the breweries are willing to come in and put an identification number on the keg so that we have an ID on every keg that is actually stamped into it, you're not going to really accomplish anything. By taking the black light out, that's better than what it was...the original bill, because that...that definitely would not work. But I still don't think that this sticker will work either and I will not be supporting the amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Schellpeper. Senator Wehrbein, on the motion to reconsider.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Madam Speaker, I support the reconsideration. And I...Senator Haberman, do you have that sticker up here at this time? I would invite those of you that are skeptical to go down to Senator Haberman's desk and try this. I think that this is certainly worth a try. Several are saying I don't think it will work. Well, I think we have just as much right to say I think it will work. It looks like a fairly sturdy adhesive, to me. And I would encourage you to look at it if you're skeptical about this. And I would say let's try it. What have we got to lose? I think the way it looks to me that it does stick very good, and in addition I think there's going to be an incentive to save it simply for the \$50. If the kegs are returned it may...I think that says in the bill that you have to have the sticker on. Right, Rex? So I would strongly urge your reconsideration.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Madam Chairman, members of the body, the State of Washington has used this program for four years, they see it is a deterrent, they've not had any stickers come off. And if you stop to think about it, they're going to put a sticker on the top third of the kegger, and on the top of the kegger, which is not going to be in ice and water. Also, I'd like to have you vision in your mind a bumper sticker, they're in ice, water, snow, slush, whatever you want, and they won't come off. So the idea that the sticker is going to come off I think is not valid and I would suggest that you vote to reconsider the bill. Thank you.
