SENATOR ABOUD: Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Robak. Senator Witek.

SENATOR WITEK: Question.

SPEAKER BAACK: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do see five hands. We'll vote on ceasing debate. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, this is a very serious issue that we're discussing. It's focusing on a change of direction in corrections. I told you about the air of good feeling. That doesn't mean that we're just going to skim over these very serious matters and run them over to Select File because people good. Questions relative to location, the type of facility, we haven't discussed really the cost of it at all. There is a Governor's study or task force that spent a lot of time talking about community corrections. The Director of Corrections thinks community corrections is a good idea as do many of the professionals in corrections throughout the country where you try to deemphasize putting everybody in prison who may be convicted of a crime and try to find other ways to deal with people. If the only thing that the boot camp is going to do is have another type of incarceration for a younger group of people, it is not the answer. I had thought it might be a good idea to have an interim study which everybody who says they have a concern about this would participate, but that failing, a decision has to be made as to whether there is enough in the way of understanding and information to create programs. Some of you all went through boot camp in the army as I did. That kind of stuff doesn't
