And the last thing I want to point out to you, this card that's out there on the rotunda, on the lower level, that's passed out to constituents and perhaps mailed to peop'e, for me to pay...I asked...I asked the Auditor to tell me how much this costs; \$310, they tell me to print this. Now that's just the printing bill. If it's being mailed to people, then that's more.

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CROSBY: That's a campaign piece. It has a picture, the name. If you just want to call the Auditor, the 800 line, you don't need to put your picture and your name on it. That's a campaign piece. If you or I did that and took them to the mailing room and had them addressed to people and, in the first place, I'm not sure how we'd get the money to have them printed because we don't have that kind of money available, but if we did that, the mail room would come back and say, you cannot do that because that is a campaign piece. So my...I'm going to vote for the amendment because of some of the things that Senator Landis pointed out and so on, it's a political issue and I just...but each person has to make up his or her own mind on this floor how you vote on this issue or any other issue. We have to feel that we did what we think is the right thing. So I thank you for however you vote. I thank Senator Landis and Senator Ashford for giving us this opportunity again.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Madam President, and members of the body, you know, we could spend all the rest of the morning here beating up on the Auditor and make us all feel good. The problem we've got, as I see it, is the public. Now I spent some time the last three weekends visiting different organizations and speaking to a couple of people and, as most of you know, the only questions...the main question you always get asked is, what are you going to do about the audit of your telephones? Well, obviously, being new here I don't have anything to hide. I haven't made any telephone calls that are that difficult for me to have audited. I spent 24 years on the county board and during that time I didn't use the public telephone for my own private use, and I don't intend to do that up here. I think
