

rules and regulations. We're registering...part of that's registration of the keg numbers at the Liquor Control Commission themselves?

SENATOR HABERMAN: I don't understand the \$20,000, but the only thing I can say....What's your question again, please?

SENATOR HOHENSTEIN: Let me ask it two different ways. You got the Cash Fund component looks like \$19,648, it says from the Rule and Regulation Cash Fund. So I'm assuming that...that it's going to cost about \$20,000 to develop the rules and regulations and maybe some forms to implement the program. Is that your understanding?

SENATOR HABERMAN: That is not my understanding. It's my understanding, from reading this, that there are approximately...\$20,000 is coming from the commission Rule and Regulation Cash Fund, that's where it's coming from.

SENATOR HOHENSTEIN: Well, what's it for?

SENATOR HABERMAN: To print the labels, make up the rules and regulations.

SENATOR HOHENSTEIN: So it is for the ru...

SENATOR HABERMAN: You know the state agencies don't anything for nothing, Senator Hohenstein.

SENATOR HOHENSTEIN: I'm learning that, I'm just wondering how expensive it is to develop rules and regulations. Does any of this, and I'm serious about this, does any of this pay for...the...the fiscal note says office supply costs involving forms and records, along with the administrative costs to actually process the registration of keg ID's. So the Liquor Control Commission is actually going to be processing the registration of the keg ID's?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Hohenstein, someone has to pay to have the forms printed. We just can't reach up in the air and pull out these forms, someone has to have them...What? Oh, Hohenstein, okay. Someone has to...Senator Hohenstein.

SENATOR HOHENSTEIN: I would have got you later on that, Rex.
