

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator...I almost said, Senator Withem, I was looking at Michelle over there, but, Senator Schimek, excuse me. It's a situation where...oh, and for those who don't know, Michelle works with Senator Withem. Senator Schimek, I think it could very easily be accomplished, what you're talking about. SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I'm going to ask that we adopt this amendment, then if Senator Schimek is going to try to put something together, we can do it and there will be time during this vote to do that.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the closing. We will now vote on the Chambers amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on the Chambers amendment and it does require 25 votes for an amendment to a resolution. Twenty-five votes is required. Have you all voted on the Chambers amendment? Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 14 ayes, 13 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment fails. Senator Schimek.
