

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I gave my copy of the resolution to the Clerk so I have to find this in the Journal quickly, quickly. I don't do anything quickly. All right. Page 318, top of the page, the resolution would read in the same area that Senator Chambers was addressing, and that normalization...and that during the period of...is that right?

CLERK: "Process of".

SENATOR COORDSEN: ... "during the process of" normalization of relations with these countries of southeast Asia, strike "be deferred (sic) until such time as", so that sentence would then read, and that normaliza...at that...during the process of normalization of relations with those countries of southeast Asia...let's see, that's...

CLERK: Would you like me to read it?

SENATOR COORDSEN: Yeah, would you read it in, please.

CLERK: I'll try.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Because I don't have a copy of it in front of me.

CLERK: Mr. President, the second resolve paragraph would read as follows, "that the Legislature urges that the respective branches of the armed services be assigned to resolve these issues, that any and all future remains returned from southeast Asia be placed for purposes of identification with the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C., and that...adding "during the process of normalization of relations with those countries of southeast Asia these issues are satisfactorily and adequately addressed." Is that consistent...

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. So we would strike "be deferred until such time as". So I would move the adoption of the amendment.
