

understand that in the latter two instances the type of military force that would be necessary to disarm gorilla groups and to ensure the delivery of all humanitarian aid at will would be military ground troops. And so, therefore, it seemed to me a reasonable cautionary note to say that if these kinds of things are going to be done, if these kinds of actions will be deemed by those who are most knowledgeable on how to control these situations necessary, then at least it ought to be the larger community, the larger international community that is acting, the United Nations, the major economic powers of the world. I think within certain grounds it is not inappropriate for America in expressing its ideals to participate heavily in being the policeman of the world, but there are two kinds of situations, one that involves our vital self-interest and also moral issues and one that involves moral issues only. And I think that the world is so full of problems that we cannot dissipate our resources on all of the issues that involve moral questions only and not our vital interests unless we have the other nations of the world sharing with us the financial burden and sharing with us the blood. So I offer this amendment to suggest mainly that we do this in cooperation with the United Nations and with our European allies, and if we have to do it by ourselves, that that be a debate for another day. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Discussion on the Beutler amendment. Senator Hartnett. Senator Schimek on the Schimek amendment.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Mr. President, members of the body, I intend to speak only once so I'm going to speak in favor of the Beutler amendment, but I'd also like to speak a little bit about the bill. I think the Beutler amendment is a good one. I think Senator Beutler has given a very good rationale for adding this to the resolution. We can't be the police force for the world and we have learned on other occasions that it is helpful to have the resources of other nations as we involve ourselves in these international affairs. So I hope that you will support the Beutler amendment. I'd also like to say just briefly that the Government Committee as mentioned by Senator Withem did have a hearing. It was a very good hearing. We heard very personal stories from the people who came to testify and the majority of those who testified were from Senator Withem's and Senator Hartnett's area, but there was also a woman from here in Lincoln who came to testify who was an immigrant to this country and who told about the situation of her relatives in Yugoslavia and left
