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with us a serious concern and worry for all the people in those countries, so with that I would just say that I am supporting the Beutler amendment and that I hope that you will support the resolution. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Warner, did you wish to address the Beutler amendment?

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I'd just briefly say I would be in support of it, but I have another problem with the...even if this is done with the...through the United Nations and the following the proposal. I have a lot of problems with what I get the gist of this where we expand from starting with removing the existing arms embargo, we go from there to a couple of times the using military air force and then I read that from that we go to the flat use of military force. I'm not prepared to vote for a resolution that suggests that we move in with unidentified, unlimited apparently military force into that area. I don't think the President is advocating that. I don't know of anyone that is advocating it. It may become eventuality if we start making these steps but I would be very hesitant to vote for a resolution which suggests that that's the direction we should move to eventually is the use of military force, whether it is with or without the participation of international forces and the United Nations.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Warner. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, this morning has turned out to be for me a very troubling and solemn time. I had thought that the thing that would occupy my mind the most would be our discussion of the workers' comp bill, but these resolutions, especially this one, have caused me to think about subjects which are not pleasant. As one of the earlier speakers pointed out, there has been very recently and there continues to be much discussion of the holocaust and that was triggered by the dedication in Washington, D.C. of the United States Holocaust Museum and the slogan or motto of that museum and similar museums throughout the country and around the world is, never again. The world should be reminded of the atrocities that occurred and the lingering aftereffects, both on those who suffered those atrocities directly, family members and friends, those who are not members of the groups that were slaughtered during the holocaust. There were gypsies, other Eastern Europeans and not just Jews. But the fact is that with
