I would be in a posi...I would vote to accept the Beutler amendment to get to the same issue of the selection of the IMEs. And I'm going to oppose the Will amendment on the theory that the Governor selecting employer and employee representatives is not as good a mechanism of getting more fairness in the IME selection than using, as Senator Beutler suggests, a majority of the court.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: A majority of which court?

SENATOR LANDIS: Of the Workers' Compensation Court.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How many...and this is for the record, how many judges are on that court?

SENATOR LANDIS: They sit in different sized panels and...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How many would it take to constitute a majority? That's what I'm getting at.

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay, my recollection is three but let me check and see if that's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator...I'll ask Senator Coordsen the same question because he may have the specific information. Senator Coordsen, would you answer a question, please.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Coordsen, how many judges are members of the Workers' Comp Court?

SENATOR COORDSEN: I understand there are seven.
