

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And my attempt to overrule that last ruling by you, you would say is out of order. Is that what you would say?

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Chambers, I would, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: For now I'll let that go.

SPEAKER BAACK: We will now vote on the advancement of LB 757. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 37 ayes, 3 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance LB 757.

SPEAKER BAACK: LB 757 advances.

CLERK: Mr. President, again priority motions, the priority motion that controls, I believe, is a motion to recess until one-thirty. That's offered by Senator Withem.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, I don't see where a motion to recess takes priority over a motion to reconsider.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Chambers, I will...I will rule that the motion to recess does take precedence. I think if you look at Rule 7, Section 9, on page 50, it says a motion to recess shall take precedence over other...over either of such motions, and one of those was a motion to adjourn. And I think a motion to adjourn is of highest priority.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr....

SPEAKER BAACK: Page 50,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SPEAKER BAACK: ...third paragraph from the bottom. And we have always ruled, in the past, that a motion to adjourn is of highest priority, this is a motion to recess, shall take precedence over a motion to adjourn. We will now proceed to vote on the motion to recess until one-thirty.
