

Senator Ashford's amendment. We are just going to not adopt that one?

SENATOR BROMM: Correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, and we have to vote on it because we've split...we've divided the question and voted on part of it, so probably the quickest thing would just be to put it to a vote and vote no?

SENATOR BROMM: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Ashford said he agrees to that, but I want him to agree on the record. Senator Ashford, would you agree that we could put it to a vote, vote no, and then take Senator Bromm's amendment?

SENATOR ASHFORD: I hate to admit to a deal like that but, yes, I think that's fine.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Ashford, did you wish to close on your amendment?

SENATOR ASHFORD: No, that's fine.

SPEAKER BAACK: Okay, we will now...we will now vote on the second half of the Ashford amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 0 ayes, 17 nays on the amendment, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: The second half of the Ashford amendment is not adopted. Mr. Clerk, an amendment.

CLERK: Senator Bromm would move to amend, Mr. President. (See FA126 on page 1729 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Well, Mr. Speaker, I will see if I can help clear up where we are at a little bit. We had Senator Hohenstein's amendment which indicated that if there were allegations of child abuse, that would be reported to a district judge. There would be an in camera hearing. If the in camera hearing substantiated the allegations, the district judge would
