SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: I made the remarks that there is a lot of crime and most of it is in north Omaha and it's unfortunate it's in north Omaha, that north Omaha seems to be the problem of a lot of crimes and we've collected guns, we've paid for guns and we still have the same crimes. So my thoughts or my remarks were not negative but they were just trying to say here is what is happening, folks. I don't think the problem is the guns, I don't think the problem is really the kids, it's the parents and, Senator Chambers, I heard a radio program coming in yesterday where the man was in charge of MAD DADS and he says, we're going to have our phone cut off, we ain't got no money, we can't do any good and I work from nine in the morning to two o'clock in the afternoon. Well, money I don't think is the answer, Senator Chambers. It's getting to the kids.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Haberman, okay, you gave me the answer and because I don't have much time that's why I am interjecting at this point. I just hope you remember that when a bill that I have coming up that talks about where the police chief ought to assign officers in terms of the greatest need, I hope you will keep that in mind because in the areas where there is the greatest need that's where we ought to assign officers on the basis of their ability to meet that need. So I'm going to let your remarks remain unchallenged for the moment and during the discussion of that other bill, but that is a different matter. I thought maybe what you were saying had something to do with the amendment that is before us and I don't think it goes directly to it and certainly not to the amendment that I am offering. The one that I offer removes those three or four words that I had mentioned to you and I hope that you will adopt it.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: I'm going to pass, Madam President, I was going to debate with Senator Chambers but I don't think that's necessary. Thank you.
