

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you for that very long point of order. Senator Avery, did you want to say something maybe?

SENATOR AVERY: Yes, I'll ask to withdraw that amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: No objections? The amendment to the amendment is withdrawn. Now we're back to the Ashford amendment. There is one more light on. Senator Kristensen, did you want to speak? Okay. We'll proceed with the vote on the Ashford amendment. Those in favor vote aye, opposed no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 2 ayes, 18 nays, Madam President, on the adoption of the amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: The amendment fails.

CLERK: Madam President, the next amendment I have to the bill is by Senator Abboud. Senator, it's the date change I believe.

SENATOR ABOUD: Yes, Madam President, members.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Abboud.

SENATOR ABOUD: It changes the effective date for the construction of the boot camp from 1996 to 1997. The study still is in place. There will still be an A bill with this proposal, but it gives the Department of Corrections additional time to make a determination as to what the proper course of the boot camp should be and that is the reason for the amendment. This amendment was drafted with the help of Senator Hohenstein and I think he'll have a few comments to make about it. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Abboud. Discussion on the Abboud amendment, Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Madam President, members, I rise to oppose Senator Abboud's amendment, though, actually, what he said is true. By adoption of this amendment you would basically remove any sort of A bill of any magnitude from this measure because it would be postponed out far enough it would not occur in this biennium, and so if that's your goal to do that, it would certainly do that and there's a rationale for doing that. I
