SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...a total of maybe up to \$20 million, I don't know. All of those different...

SENATOR BEUTLER: No, no.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No.

SENATOR BEUTLER: No, the entire fund in the waste reduction side last year was about 2.8 million.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay, but he was enumerating a number of other fees as well as the ones...

SENATOR BEUTLER: And the revenue generated in the other fund, the litter fund, was about \$600,000, so the total generated funds is something like 3.4.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: But he was talking about a number of other environmental funds that aren't covered by this bill having to do with petroleum and everything.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Oh, I'm sorry, I wasn't listening to that part of the issue apparently.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I guess my question is, yeah, chemigation fees, petroleum release remedial fees, I mean, he went...
