SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: I can't give a definite answer to that. I mean the way the whole A bill on 491 was drafted, there was \$600,000 extra left in there for cash flow in General Funds. And so there was money the first year, and in all likelihood, if this amendment is adopted, in the second year of the biennium, DMV is going to be short of money, and you have to put more General Funds in there. I mean, obviously, simple...Senator Bernard-Stevens understands it better than I do, if you raise it to 48, you are going to collect less money, I can't tell you if that is 100, 300, or 500, but anywhere within that range is possible.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would, unless Senator Fisher would like his time back...he has waived off. Thank you, I appreciate the time.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Your light is the next one on, did you wish to speak further.
