

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you, and I should have 50 seconds left. In talking, I wanted to finish with Senator Kristensen that dialogue on the economic impact, talked with the fiscal staff, quite honestly, the number, 5.7, is a guess. It is a guess whether it is going to be there. With the unobligated balances and what's there, the impact of the Chambers amendment should be negligible for this biennium. And by that time, we are going to...the numbers will flow out and we would have a chance to look at it. But the actual impact for the biennium should be negligible at that point because we don't know what that...what the actual number would be. Senator Chambers, I give you the balance of my time...your time.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, maybe I should limit Senator Bernard-Stevens to a minute all the time because what he said did have great significance, and I am glad he took the time for that purpose. And, Senator Vrtiska, it kind of touched on what you were trying to get at when you asked why was 33 the number selected, and nobody can give a reason. All of these things that Senator Moore has said, and Senator Kristensen has said are speculative. They are going to start out by admitting nobody knows, but somehow 33 is better than 48. If reducing the price is going to get them more people buying the license, having more people buy it at a higher rate than \$33 is going to give them more money, and it would also diminish the political impact of the body reducing this fee by more than 50 percent, reducing it by more than 50 percent by raising others by 66 2/3 and some them by more than 100 percent. You've raised some by more than 100 percent. This one is to be reduced by more than 50 percent. Forty-eight dollars, as Senator Hall pointed out, with some vehicles would represent two tanks full of gas, but however it is calculated, this amendment I think is reasonable in light of what has been done with this bill so far. So I am asking that you adopt it.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard the closing on the Chambers amendment to the committee amendments. We will now vote on the amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? A record vote has been requested. Have you all voted? Senator Chambers.
