SENATOR HORGAN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and members, just to follow up on Senator Chambers, and he and I have talked about the amendment that he is going to offer now on Select File, and I feel a little bit guilty because I'm the one that gave him the Buck Rogers' study, I guess, to look at and so it's dangerous when you give somebody a little information. I will not debate the merits of that amendment on the floor at this time but simply would say, as Chairman of the Retirement Committee, I would encourage you, if you look at the amendment and have questions, myself and my staff would be happy to answer any questions you might have about it. And maybe you wouldn't want to just go to Senator Chambers, although I'm certain he would give you good advice on the merits of that amendment, but I would be happy to offer the services of the Retirement Committee in talking about that amendment. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Horgan. Senator Avery.

SENATOR AVERY: Mr. President and members, I was going to help Senator Chambers out a minute here. The other two things that this bill does is, one, currently there's an additional 10 percent of the court costs that goes into the retirement fund. It will eliminate that. It also provides a period that you have to be a judge for five years before you're vested, essentially, in the retirement fund. I just wanted to add that for the record.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Avery. Any further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Lindsay said he waives. Senator Moore is closing. No, Senator Moore, do you wish to close?

SENATOR MOORE: I will give my time to Senator Lindsay.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Lindsay is not here. He waives closing. We will now vote on the advancement of LB 832. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted on the advancement of LB 832? Record, Mr. Clerk.
