\$500,000 in the Charitable Gaming, and \$700,000 in the Tobacco Products Fund, and the second year it's 750, and 1.05.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Now, would that be like the tax on smokeless tobacco, or what is that from?

SENATOR MOORE: These are. Obviously the cigarette tax is that 27 cents is earmarked. These are the other tobacco products like smokeless, like pipe, like snuff, being not that familiar with all those tobacco products, I don't know what else there is.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Thank you. Also, what happens, Senator, if we pass 330...

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: ...and we get to the point where we don't, say that some of the revenue bills don't pass. Then we start picking and choosing in 330?

SENATOR MOORE: Well, obviously, the majority will exercise its will in one way or the other. If you're asking the question of me, the answer to that is, yes. I mean if you look at the sheet you can afford to do a few things. But I'm concerned about trying to do some...if you don't raise those revenues, I don't think 330 ought to be spending this amount of money.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Um-hmm.

SENATOR MOORE: But I...I...I am of the opinion, with 815 as it now stands and with the cigarette as it now stands, you can certainly afford to do LB 330, but realizing you still have a problem two years from now, to some degree, but I think it's manageable.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: But if one of those doesn't pass, Senator, then we're in trouble with LB 330, right?

SENATOR MOORE: Well, that...
