PRESIDENT MOUL: Time.

SENATOR DAY: Madam President and members, I, too, rise in support of the Bohlke amendment this afternoon. I really hate that we're having this discussion. I can't help it. I rise with some frustration again. I spent my lunch hour discussing problems of children in our state, problems such as physical and sexual abuse, poverty, health care and teenage pregnancies. I can't help but wonder if we could have spent the same time that we have spent on this issue and some of the same commitment from all parties if it wouldn't have had more effect and more effect on having fewer abortions in this state. Sixty-seven percent of the women who have abortions have them because they feel they cannot support raising a child. Thirty-three percent of the women that have abortions make under 11,000 dollars a year. Teenage pregnancies, in my hometown just a couple weekends ago I had my eyes opened. I was in a discussion and they were talking about the number of teenagers that were pregnant in our community and there were five in our junior high school and they said three of them are new. And I said, well, wait a minute, what do you mean new? Well, two of them had been pregnant before. This was their second child. This is in junior high school. This is where I really wish we could be putting our efforts instead of what we're doing today. But dealing with the Bohlke amendment, which I think is a good piece of legislation, I think it does what we want to do, it gets the information out there to the people, it talks about informed consent and we've had some discussion on this. In looking in the Women's Medical Center, the forms that are filled out, there is already informed consent there. They are asked to sign where they go into a lot of the medical background, but there's interesting...the last
