

unrestrained, we would be able to craft some, I think, very descent legislation that Senator Bohlke, Senator Rasmussen and some of the others have...types of things that have suggested, but we're not unrestrained. We can't look at...I was saying to Senator Pirsch that we look at the Bohlke amendment, just looking at it and reading it on paper it looks pretty good, but we have to look at it in terms of all the case law that's out there. We have to look at it in terms of our other statutes. We have to look at it in terms of the way that abortion, unfortunately or fortunately, has evolved in this country. Abortions are not done in this country under the...the care of a physician with whom someone has a long, established relationship, a patient-physician relationship. They are done by doctors who are, for the most part, mercenary in what they do. They do abortions in a...in a...assembly line sort of fashion and I think we have to look at the way that they are done right now. As I mentioned and, from the articles in the paper, this isn't me talking, this is our favorite daily that's talking that says in the article in the paper that said, they referred to it, abortion is a business. This is not...we try to elevate it to this lofty thing of a constitutional right and this lofty thing of protection of whatever rights we're talking about, but the bottom line is if those people in Philadelphia who own the clinic in Omaha, who staff the clinic in Omaha with a doctor when he ought to be...when he...when the physicians need to be done and then with a nurse to do some of the other stuff, we're not even talking about good care in the first place, I don't think, or I shouldn't say good care but the quality of care that Americans have learned to expect and that's not right and we have to look at the way things are done...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR LINDSAY: ...in our country. Now, reviewing the Bohlke amendment in terms of the way things are, I think we get to the point that there may be some good in it and I've spoken with Ardyce and there are some good things in it. Having the materials available to anybody from the Department of Health, as Senator Rasmussen and Senator Bohlke have suggested, is a good thing and I would hope the department would have enough of those printed up so that anybody can get ahold of those. I agree with Senator Rasmussen when she says this information should be known by women before they get pregnant. Absolutely agree women ought to be educated. Men ought to be educated. Both ought to have that information available, but we are dealing here with a more
