I don't know about you, but I read with alarm the Time Magazine article in which militant right-to-life organizations had formed a camp, a training camp in Florida, with which to train people on how to shut down clinics, how to take civil disobedience to the maximum, how to harass and follow doctors, how to get information from license plates with which to invade the personal privacy of patients, of staff assistants, of doctors, giving them more access to hounding people out of making the decisions for themselves. At the very time in which this kind of a militant extremist camp is being organized, graduating its personnel, sending them throughout the country to do this kind of harassment, civil disobedience and in some cases violent activity, in an attempt to coerce and harass people out of making decisions. Cynically we have the attempt to create some kind of pristine or pure body of knowledge, some kind of list of appropriate information to have to get informed consent. I wonder if it...if the barricades that are...

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...outside of abortion clinics constitute attempts to get informed consent. There is no desire. The desire is, in fact, to load the process. It is the desire to use whatever means necessary to stop abortion. Understand that when you believe that abortion is morally wrong and that any legal right that one might be exercising in furtherance of a moral wrong that you are ethically entitled to do practically anything to stop that from occurring. It's one of those render unto Caesar what is Caesar's but render unto God what is God's. That is to say, the law may call this an invasion of privacy. The law may call this harassment. The law may call this trespass but it is justified by greater, higher ends, moral values that others don't share but I will impose upon them if I can in furtherance of my religious beliefs. Recognize the difference between somebody who is following that path...

SPEAKER BAACK: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...and the stated goals of an LB 110. The real mechanism here is to undo consent and deny consent across the board with respect to the right to life movement and this is but one avenue in which that strategy is pursued.
