I'm hopeful that we're moving towards that goal yet tonight and maybe we can reach that goal. And I know that...I was interested in what Senator Landis was talking about earlier when he was rendering unto Caesar, I think, or maybe somebody, but whatever...from my district when you talk about rendering, Senator Landis, it always perks my ears, so I will yield the rest of my time to yourself.

**SPEAKER BAACK:** Senator Landis.

**SENATOR LANDIS:** Thank you, Senator Baack, thank you, Senator Hohenstein. One of the things I was talking about in my last chance to speak was the relationship between the opportunity to harass people who go to clinics and legislation, at least in other states and potentially here in various forms for women who have to cross the gauntlet of anti-choice protestors. In many instances, the waiting period increases the exposure of women to seeking...who are seeking abortions to harassment and hostility. Let me tell you that in Mississippi, Roy McMillan finally said it out loud, and he acknowledged it in public record in a Christian action group. This is an anti-choice group in Mississippi. He admitted that waiting periods give abortion opponents more time to track down women who are considering abortion services. This is a quotation of his. What the 24-hour waiting period will do is to allow us to trace who the women are, to follow them home in an attempt to find someone, their parent, their husband, their boy friend, none of which have the right in our state to even know that the woman is pregnant. Now, that I don't believe is an uncommon strategy. I don't believe that it is a denounced strategy, I think it's a coming strategy which will grow more and more common as our conflict occurs in this country. Now, understand that 110 comes
