

very simply the providing of information to the woman so that she can make that decision. And we come from two different viewpoints again, but I think we arrive at the same point and that is that we're taking out the criminal liability so I think those, my pro-choice colleagues, are less concerned about a highly intrusive sort of procedure, less intru...offended by government coming down upon this decision. From my viewpoint, if a woman is denied the information, denied access to this information, she does have redress and it will have what I hope the effect is. I hope we don't...well, I suspect we will, but I hope we don't have a flood of lawsuits, or I shouldn't say a flood but some lawsuits and I hope that doesn't happen because I hope what will come out of this is that people will provide...the doctors will provide the information and that women will, hopefully, be able to come to a conclusion, a decision that they can live with, that they can...that they aren't sometime down the road going to be hurting because they regret so deeply a decision that they've made. Certainly, I come from a viewpoint where I hope, and I guess my position is that I think it will reduce abortions. There are those who think it won't have any impact, and that's something that neither one of us is...we're not going to agree on. And there are issues here that we simply will never agree on but I think this now is a good bill. I really think this is something that's been crafted to the point that I think it does accomplish that which so many of us want to do. And that is the other night when...I shouldn't, but, Senator Chambers, I...the comment I made to him was that the other night when...if the Speaker had recognized me to bring us up on where we had left off on LB 110, just catch us up, my comment was going to be that we were just ready, Senator Pedersen was going to lead us in a group hug and that was kind of a...never mind. (Laughter.) But that night we had a lot of, I think, what I saw happening is that everybody in this body wants to do what's right. We want to do something. We know there's something that just doesn't sit right with us and we want to do what is right but we're not quite sure, each of us have a different idea of how to get there. I think this comes pretty close. I would hope that the amendment would be adopted. I would hope that the bill would be advanced. If Senator...if there is any time left, I would yield it to Senator Chambers.
