SENATOR HALL: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...or from one dwelling, from your, for the dwelling that you have on that, I'll say on an island, to the nearest road that you could park a car on to get away from.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Let's assume that I was ten miles down and decided I wanted to start my point of direct access ten miles down for a little cruise, so I go a direct line ten miles down river, direct line to my, to my dwelling, or the dwelling that I'm going to. Would that be permissible under the amendment?

SENATOR JANSSEN: If that, if there wasn't a road or a trail that you could gain access to the river that was more, more than five miles or ten miles, then I guess you could.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Okay.

SENATOR JANSSEN: But if you had a, if you had a road within a half a mile, I'm sure that that would be the most direct route to your dwelling.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Okay. Again, I just may not read it the same way as you do. On line 8 and 7 I read "by the most direct route to and from such land or dwellings." And it might be there. And if you're comfortable with that, that's fine, but I wanted to at least have what your intent was on the record. Thank you.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Bernard-Stevens. Is there any other discussion on the Beutler amendment to the Janssen amendment? Seeing none, Senator Beutler, to close on your amendment. Waives closing on the amendment. The question is, the adoption of the Beutler amendment to the Janssen amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on the Beutler amendment to the Janssen amendment, Mr. President.
