

Moore, what my amendment does is to reduce... (laughs), Senator Moore has got it, to reduce the three back to two where it was automatically. So that's what would happen when we strike the three and reinstate the stricken two. And instead of going from ten to fifteen, we go from ten to...right. Senator Moore has got soul. Members of the Legislature, that's what the amendment does. Let me tell you what my feeling is about these fees that are charged to allow somebody to even get into the park. I believe that this land should be owned in common by all of the citizens for the benefit of the citizens, if you'll let me describe it in that fashion. There are some people who might take their family out to the park. Some people might like the sounds of nature. They might like to watch clouds scudding through the sky. They might like to be munched upon by mosquitoes and other vermin who also have to live. And the park is where they want to go. I don't think that we should look at these parks primarily as a means to raise money when to do so would prevent people from coming to these parks. There are things that Game and Parks want to do and there are other things that they might find necessary to do. I'm sure that they will spend more money at the Mahoney State Park or Platte River State Park than they will someplace like Indian Cave Park where I went one time. And all it is is a slight recess in the, in a hill, or in the face of a...that's all it was. And if you saw...no, Senator Schimek, if you and Senator Bohlke saw anything that went six feet into the face of the wall, you were at the wrong place. I went there and it is not a cave. I went to another park which billed itself as having the only waterfall in Nebraska. And it was about at the level of what you would call a Nebraska waterfall. It was just, little, a little trickle of water going over the edge of a rock face. That, that was what they called a waterfall, and technically they were telling the truth because the water did fall from where it was. That might have been Platte River State Park. They got little trails and you walk through these trails and you see all these different things which from the city you don't see or they don't expect you to see, so you're dazzled 'cause you see a waterfall. And in some parts of the city, buildings with sloping roofs, when it rains hard, have a more impressive waterfall than that. But I don't feel that we ought to raise these fees this much. I don't think the Game and Parks Commission will spend as much time and effort on all of the parks throughout the state. There are certain ones that they know are going to be visited by the important people, and those are the showpieces. So, if they're going to spend money upgrading these cabins and these other
