

compromise and it would bring support to the bill or maybe mitigate some opposition so everything else would go by the boards. What Senator Hall is offering now is what I want to ask Senator Landis a question about. Suppose, instead of saying that the activities of the Workers' Comp Court would be subject to the Administrative Procedures Act, we simply lifted the significant portions of that act without labeling it the act and required the court to comply with these provisions in adopting and promulgating rules. Would that lessen your opposition?

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator Chambers, a...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ..perhaps you've identified something that would solve a constitutional difficulty, I mean if I understood the nature of the question correctly. I'll tell you this. I think when I see what we adopted last on the Abboud amendment that adequate due process standards are met and identified so I'm comfortable with that. I'm not sure that exhausts the possibilities of things that might be acceptable, but I'm comfortable with that and I don't want to enter into, at this point, sort of a writing up on the floor an amendment which conjecturally might be possibly be acceptable, but I do know that the Hall amendment that is before us I think is a flawed approach to getting rules and regs. Now, I understand...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you...

SENATOR LANDIS: ..that Senator Hall doesn't feel that way, but....

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think making these draft copies available at the Compensation Court, which would be in Lincoln, is sufficient to make it known to the public throughout the state? Is that really...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Time. Senator Chambers, your light is next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, thank you very much. Members of the Legislature, here's what I'm going to say before I ask Senator Landis a question because I want to make a point before my time is eaten up with our back and forth. Many times, things are done pro forma in the laws that we enact. We
