

say that the public is going to be given notice in such and such a manner. In this instance the Abboud amendment says, quote, draft copies of all such rules and regulations shall be available to the public at the Compensation Court at the time of giving notice. So when they give notice I guess they have a copy of these rules available and if you didn't get the notice out of one of these newspapers you don't have any way of knowing unless you're a subscriber and have paid to have them send you this information. So the ones who are going to be directly affected don't really have a way of obtaining notice. Senator Landis, under the Administrative Procedures Act, what kind of notice to the public, if you know, would...

SENATOR LANDIS: I think...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, I'll ask...

SENATOR LANDIS: ..Senator Hall is...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR LANDIS: ..appropriate (inaudible).

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Hall, can you give me any information because I really am not sure?

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Mr. President and members. Senator Chambers, the notice is that there would have to be a publication in a newspaper of general circulation and then the copies would be submitted or sent out to county libraries upon request. So the requirement of...or the dissemination of the rules and regs would be to a much greater extent probably a much more geographic distribution than what the Abboud amendment currently allows for, which is the court here in Lincoln.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Let me ask Senator Landis a question based on that information. Senator Landis, what would be wrong with expanding the dissemination?

SENATOR LANDIS: Actually, I listened to Senator Hall say that county libraries could get them at the library's request. The Abboud amendment says anybody who wants one, who says to the court I want one as a subscriber, can get one. Now that could include not only the 93 county libraries if they made it a request, but it could be anybody else. Senator Chambers, isn't
