SENATOR LANDIS: I believe that one is to be withdrawn, followed by another amendment that Senator Hall and I have cosigned. Let me see if that's the correct understanding with the Clerk. The good amendment is 4051, and the one to be pulled is 3910, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Well, so you want to pull 3475 as well, Senator? That's the first one you have.

SENATOR LANDIS: Yes, 4051 is the one that Senator Hall and I share an interest in.

CLERK: And the others go away? AM4051 is the one you want, Senator? (AM4051 appears on page 1480 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you. Senator Hall and I share an interest in AM4051. There are some provisions of measures that were unanimously adopted on bills that were on consent calendar but lower down the list. Mine is the brew-pub bill, which indicates that brew-pubs may sell 50 percent of their annual production for off-sale consumption, and that a brew-pub licenseholder may obtain an annual catering license and allow them to sell their brew-pub beer as a caterer. The other changes are technical in nature and come from the Liquor Control Commission, I believe. And I surrender the rest of my time to Senator Hall to summarize those for the body.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Madam President, members. Thank you, Senator Landis. The provisions that deal with the amendment, as it's found in 4051, that I cosponsored with Senator Landis, deal with the...a manager of a corporate licensee. And currently the law states that manager...if there is a license in the county, the manager must live in that county. What this change does is it mirrors language that was in a liquor commission bill that did not get prioritized. What it says is that a manager must be a resident of the State of Nebraska. What this allows for is that individuals who hold licenses in more than one county, to designate one individual to be that manager, so that when there is a change in the manager, you'll see if you follow, at least I know the city council agenda, for example, in Omaha, there is always a laundry list of changes with regard to managers because those individuals either move out of the county, or they move on
