When I mentioned improvements, I mean there might be a clarification of a word here, a clarification of a word there, but there are substantive items that have not been touched and I think that's because those who support this bill have not read the actual language of the bill as contained in the E & R amendments. I want Senator Schimek's amendment. I'd like to ask Senator Wesely a question.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wesely, while we're controlling people's children, can we add that they should go to church regularly also?

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: I have a feeling that the constitution would probably prohibit that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why would it prohibit it? It's not saying what church.

SENATOR WESELY: Well I think religious freedom would be guaranteed that you don't need to believe in church at all, let alone what church you go to so...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wesely, is there anything in this...do we have a provision of statute or a number of provisions of statute that deals specifically with home schooling and home schools and what constitutes a home school?

SENATOR WESELY: Yeah, I remember that debate quite well, uh-huh, yes, we do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now if we just have the term school in this bill, there's nothing that indicates that it includes home schools, does it, is there?

SENATOR WESELY: No, you're right and we have a very weak process in regulating them.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if a person does have his or her children in a home school, this could be used as a way to get them out of
