

longer sees it as their liability. And if I understand, that is not your intent.

SENATOR WESELY: That's correct.

SENATOR HALL: With that, and I appreciate that, and I appreciate your assistance in continuing to follow up on this because I know that there are going to have to be issues that have to be addressed as it relates to this specific topic probably more than any other in the bill. With that, I appreciate that, Senator Wesely, and I appreciate the work that you, Senator Rasmussen, and Senator Bohlke have done on this piece of legislation, whether I agree with it or not. The...I would then ask, Mr. President, if I could withdraw this amendment.

SPEAKER WITHEM: You don't even have to ask, Senator Hall, it is withdrawn. Mr. Clerk, next item.

CLERK: Senator Crosby would move to amend the bill, Mr. President. (Crosby amendment, AM4307, appears on pages 1887-88 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Crosby.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm sorry, I lost one of my notes and I'm looking for it. This amendment, I promise, is my last amendment. And what it does, I have passed it out to you, it's number 4307, as you see on the board. And I think that it's pretty clear if you pay attention to what it says. It strikes Sections 13 through 26 and inserts a new section. And that, in effect, takes out the last part of 1224. I do go on to say that the welfare system must be reformed, it's necessary to determine the potential impact of certain proposed eligibility rules and public assistance changes to the welfare system on recipient children and families and agencies, and so on. And what I'm asking is that the Governor would establish the Welfare Reform Act Impact Study Committee, and name the people that...name the departments and the agencies and so on that should be involved, and it should include representatives from county government, Foster Care Review Board, school districts and municipalities. The reason I'm asking, and there are other classifications, too. The reason I'm asking for this is I still feel that the two-year limit is arbitrary and unrealistic, and I think the family cap has the same impact. I think you
