PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Withem.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Yes, just a comment to members, please. I know it's getting time for the dinner hour. It looks to me as though we have time for this motion. There will be one more bill under this characterization, I think it's a simple...Senator Wesely, it's a simple date change in a bill. I would request that members maybe stick to their seats and get these two items done relatively quickly, then we'll return to Select File. I anticipate that there may be some debate and discussion on the next bill, and so at that time we'll have a little more time to move about. But I'd appreciate if people would stick close so we can get this amendment dealt with and the next bill with the motion to return and the amendment on it. So, other than that, I think Senator Wickersham has a wonderful amendment.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I don't, I don't think it's a wonderful amendment. My notion is that I think disabled people tell us they want the same options to do things that people who are not disabled have. I don't find that what they say is we want the rules lower for us, we want more options, we ask for special privileges. When, for example, they ask for access to public buildings they're saying we want to go where nondisabled people go. But they don't say we want longer hours, or we want more attention to us. And I think the notion that says we're going to write two sets of standards, one of which are for disabled, and one of which are for nondisabled, and expand those options is not what I think the disabled community generally has tried to ask us to do in public policy. I'm going to vote no on the amendment. I don't think it's a good idea to create two different standards like this. I think it's more appropriate that we allow for hunting and if there's a way to make hunting available to disabled people, I think that's fine. But if it's bad for the take of an animal population that we shoot a male or a female, then that ought to be the standard rule for everybody. And I think the disabled community should be able to understand that and accept that. I think they're asking for an extra privilege that we shouldn't give.
