

more comfortable if we had a bill like this, if, in fact, it passes, that had these conditions in it. You know, with good intentions, I accept the good intentions and I honor those good intentions but I would rather us have everybody included that is necessary to be included in the bill now than pass something and hope it gets in next year.

SENATOR BROMM: With that in mind, on the first page of your bill, where you add to the definition of official in the Executive Branch, administrator, faculty member or staff member of a state college or state university, does that...that has the effect of requiring those folks to provide a disclosure of financial interest and that sort of thing?

SENATOR LYNCH: Yes, it does.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay, now you are talking about a staff member of a state college or a state university. Now I assume you are talking about clerical, you are talking about coaches, you are talking about anyone who is a member of the staff of that university or college.

SENATOR LYNCH: Uh...

SENATOR BROMM: I'm not sure what staff means, that is what I am driving at.

SENATOR LYNCH: I'm trying to find the language where I say, oh, I see, or a faculty member or a staff member of a state college or university board. Now what I had in mind, obviously, wasn't somebody who maintains the buildings or fixes the roof. What I had in mind was staff people who, in fact, spend the money; purchasing agents, supervisors, professors who are doing research and accept grants from third parties and then go in business for themselves afterwards and still stay on the university staff and, in fact, collect both salaries. If those same persons were state senators, they would be forced off, either out of their company or out of the university. So there are a number of different standards there. It is a good question and I'm sorry, Senator, I can't, except for my intentions were to include those staff members and faculty members who would fall probably under the criteria of...
