by Senator Wesely as Chair of the committee. That's all that I have, Mr. President.

**SPEAKER WITHEM:** Members, please take your seats. We are on Final Reading. The game plan tonight is to do Final Reading until such time as all bills have been reported down from E & R. I do not know how long that will take. It could take some time yet and I would suggest to the body that we may want to consider, because we've had two fairly lengthy nights, looks to me like tomorrow's agenda and the next day is in pretty good shape, that we may want not to try to stay until the final witching hour tonight. So when all the bills come down I will so advise you and we can make a decision about what we may wish to do. First bill on Final Reading, Mr. Clerk, is LB 358.

**CLERK:** (Read LB 358 on Final Reading.)

**SPEAKER WITHEM:** All provisions of law having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 358E pass? Record, Mr. Clerk.

**CLERK:** (Read record vote. See pages 2015-16 of the Legislative Journal.) 36 ayes, 2 nays, 6 present and not voting, 5 excused and not voting, Mr. President

**SPEAKER WITHEM:** LB 358E passes. LB 779, Mr. Clerk.

**CLERK:** Mr. President, Senator Moore would move to return the bill for purposes of striking the enacting clause.

**SPEAKER WITHEM:** Senator Moore, you are recognized on your motion.

**SENATOR MOORE:** A question of Senator Lindsay, to start with. I see he's not here. Maybe Senator Hall can...well...it's my understand...I'll preface my remarks, obviously we received back from the Governor his veto message that included the money for the probation officers.

**SPEAKER WITHEM:** Correct.

**SENATOR MOORE:** The way it was structured, the language in 779, I believe is the number of the bill we're on, had a requirement in there that the probation officer paid a salary commensurate with other people in the profession or something to that effect. Well, we did not have that in an A bill, we put it in the budget
