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because I certainly didn't know that when I came into the body. I learned from Senator Warner that term limits are a bad idea, of course. And I want to thank Senator Lindsay for allowing me to run for Congress at the time of the crime summit, thank you very much. And of course, of course, Senator Chambers who teaches all of us that if you do what you believe in, you can never lose. Last night I was going home to Omaha by myself which was fortunate for the rest of you, but I was going home and I called my daughter on my mobile phone and my daughter, Elly, is seven. I shared this with a couple of my friends earlier, but my daughter, Elly, is seven and a half years old and she has been...only known me as a state senator and I told her, you know, Elly, I'm sorry I'm not home tonight, but this is the last night that I'll be late because I'll be through with the Legislature and she just started crying and crying and I couldn't...she said, well, I just always thought of you, you're a state senator, aren't you going to be a senator anymore? And it was a very touching experience for me because of course she hasn't known me as anyone other than a state senator and as a legislator and I told her that I would find something else to do and I think she was okay with that, but...and I don't know what I will be doing after tonight, but I do know that whatever it is, I will be carrying with me a tremendous amount of warmth and love for all of you and for all of those that I have served with, for the staff that have worked with me and especially for the people of the State of Nebraska who are wonderful and thank you all very much, and thank you, Pat and Dick, for being so patient with me through all the years. Thank you all very much.
