SPEAKER WITHEM PRESIDING

SPEAKER WITHEM: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen, welcome to the George W. Norris Legislative Chamber as we begin today, the twenty-seventh day of the Ninety-Fourth Legislature, Second Session. We're pleased to have from Senator Vrtiska's district, Pastor Anthony Dawson from the First Methodist Church in Auburn, Nebraska.

PASTOR DAWSON: (Prayer offered.)

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you very much, Pastor. Members, please record your presence.

CLERK: I have a quorum present, Mr. President.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Are there any corrections to the Journal?

CLERK: I have no corrections, Mr. President.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Messages, reports, or announcements.

CLERK: Confirmation report from the Education Committee. And Education Committee reports LB 741 as indefinitely postponed. (See pages 787-88 of the Legislative Journal.) That's all that I have, Mr. President.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Mr. Clerk, it's my understanding that we will momentarily see the presence of a Senator Lindsay in the Chamber, so maybe if we could momentarily move to...let's move to LB 1002 and then we'll come back and pick up LB 909 when Senator Lindsay actually physically gets here.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 1002, introduced by Senator Kristensen. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 4 of this year, referred to the Judiciary Committee, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Kristensen, to open on your bill.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. This bill deals with the statutory rule against perpetuities. If you've ever gone to law school and decided that it was the most boring experience and the most troubling
